"Speaking alone will not work; we must also be prepared to act."

Recent reports in Jamaica of increasing violence, especially violence against women, were highlighted for action by the newly inducted UCJCI Moderator, Rt. Rev. Gary Harriott, in his first address to the church after induction. "In the Jamaican context, there is a thick cloud of darkness hovering; a dark cloud of violence; gender-based violence; violence against our women and girls and the abuse of our children. There is deeper concern regarding what is happening with some of our boys and men; what's going on in their minds and heart. There are voices reaching out to the church for help in this crisis and clearly, we are not immune to these troubling realities. We are a people committed to justice and peace, so let us get ready to roll up our sleeves; step into the social murky waters and be God's agents of



hope and transforlight. He invited the Synod to wear black on Thursday in the week of the Synod and all other Thursdays to join the worldwide movement inspired by the World Council of Churches, dubbed. "Thursdays in Black."

"Black that speaks of our strength; black that demonstrates our solidarity with those who are victims of violence; black that makes a statement of our commitment to work for a world without rape and violence." 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


The 42nd Synod of The United Church in Jamaica and the Cayman Islands concluded on Sunday April 18, 2021 after a week of bible study, worship, business sessions, a public lecture and capacity building webinar.

OUTCOMES OF SYNOD

Worship experiences and sermon challenges, collegial engagement, discussion groups, reports and collected discernment have stimulated ideas and plans to faithfully engage the work of mission in the next Synodical period.

Over the next period, the United Church is determined to continue to Worship, Work and Witness while reviewing, re-orienting and strategizing in the following areas:



Training, advocacy, the development of resource material, succession planning, developing new ministries are among the strategies identified which will be further developed through the relevant Synodical Committees, regional mission council structures and auxiliaries. **So, WATCH THIS SPACE.**

Expressions from the Youth Synod

Young people from the United Church across four regions met on Tuesday April 13 for what they described as a very enriching and beneficial session. Firm in their belief that they are vital contributors to the United Church and, like the bamboo, are Durable, Strong, and Resilient especially in stressful situations. In their report to the Synod on Thursday April 15, they shared challenges which will provide opportunities to improve youth ministry and the Vision they will pursue over the next two years.

Challenges

- Boost youth interest, attendance, and participation at UCYPF planned events
- Encourage volunteerism for leadership
- Improve the mutual understanding of communication at all levels



- Strengthen UCYPF relationships across regions by scheduling interaction time and connecting more with youths especially those who are not on Zoom
- Have more youth ministers to enhance the ministry to youths and help by designing activities for youths whilst monitoring the outcomes of same

Improve the level of discipleship by journeying through scriptures and tough questions/issues

Advocate for more opportunities for youths to serve in different areas of the Church's life.

Develop more educational and professional opportunities for youth

Improve consistency as youths tend to feel extremely supported at times, and at other times, not so much

Improve prayer and worship, evangelism, advocacy community service, life skills, mentorship and recreation.

Vision

- Grow numerically and spiritually
- Provide a vibrant youth ministry with young people being passionate about God, living exemplary lives, growing in knowledge of God and serving God and the Church
- Be empowered for leadership within Youth Ministry.
- Develop mentorship programme for youths
- Have more youth ministers
- Increase representation across the ministries of the United Church
- Be passionate about and involved in evangelism
- Implement professional development seminars for youth
- Develop a programme for youth to offer pastoral care to other youths
- Capitalise on the technological possibilities to advance the work of youth ministry.



HIGHLIGHTS OF RAYMOND COKE LECTURE

"Pastoral care in our times demands competent pastors willing to be servant leaders."

The functions of Pastoral Care were lifted up by the presenter. These functions were identified as Healing, Guiding, Sustaining, Reconciling, Nurturing, Liberating and Empowering. All of these were deemed as necessary and relevant in the current context. Additionally, when rooted deeply in the Christian faith they can indeed bring HOPE. For Dr. Nyomi, Pastoral Care as a response that brings HOPE, will seek to restore people to holistic

health, help them to find opportunities in the midst of challenges, ensure that communities, people and the entire creation experience shalom/peace, and enhances the church's ability to engage effectively in evangelism.

"Long, selfless energetic and faithful service."

An excerpt from the Tribute from the UCJCI Synod.

Raymond Coke embraced an understanding of the pastoral role best captured in the biblical imagery of the 'shepherd'. Such an under-

standing led to the conviction that the office is exercised primarily through caregiving and leadership.

Pursuant to the former, he exercised a visitation ministry that was second to none and which included home and hospital. This he did without neglecting the children, youth and young adults who experienced him as being both genuine and approachable. Where the context allowed, he seized the opportunity for meaningful engagement with public education institutions with staff and students being the focus of his care.

"A Bright and Hopeful Future" —*Closing Service Challenge*

Moderator, Rt. Rev. Gary Harriott issued a sending charge to close the 42nd Synod of the United Church. Here is an excerpt from the sermon.

"In Isaiah 55, the prophet, from the belly of the Exile; as God's spokesman; God's mouthpiece, holds up before God's people a vision of a bright and hopeful future; a future marked by these critical words, "Instead of...Instead of". Let's hold those critical words in our hearts and spirits; ...they represent the bridge between what is and what shall be. The prophet describes a future marked by those critical words, "Instead of" even as he described a future that was anchored on the reliable and dependable Word of God. And so I invite you to envisage with the Prophet; to envisage with me; to dream with me; to vision with me a future that is Bright and Hopeful for the United Church in Jamaica and the Cayman Islands; a future that is bright for the Cayman Islands and for Jamaica land we love, and because God has not abandoned His world and God's people are scattered across the globe, let us dream for them as well; let us capture in our spirit a future that is bright and hopeful.

- The **Bright and Hopeful Future** that the prophet describes, does not ignore the **Challenges of the Time**
- The change that was to come; the hope of a bright future, was anchored in the word of God
- In this season of thornbush and briars we need to hear afresh what God is saying to us. Name your thornbush; name your briars; name those things that are robbing you of meaning and life, and seek a Word from God. Make sure it is a Word from God.

Some signs of hope were revealed at Synod –e.g, our response to the COVID 19 pandemic and our grasping of the opportunities that are presenting themselves; the peacebuilding in Norwood; the accompaniment of the brokenhearted by the Bethesda Centre in Cayman and Theodora in Negril; the resurrection of the outreach at North Street United and we know that there are others that were not featured, but we need to experience more joy and see more "going out in peace." We need to see more mountains bursting into song and more trees clapping their hands.

Let us remain Rooted in Christ; Resilient In the face of challenges and trails, so that we may have Bright and Hopeful Future.

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LUCEA UNITED CHURCH IN PARTNERSHIP TO SUPPORT EDUCATION

Baywest Wellness Hospital Awards 10 Teritary Level Students with Bursaries

The Family Life Ministries of the Lucea United Church is delighted to partner with Baywest Wellness Hospital to provide financial support and contribute to the empowerment of our youths through education.

Baywest Wellness Hospital has provided one million dollars through bursaries to cover tuition cost for ten tertiary level students in the parish of Hanover. The recipients are enrolled in a full-time undergraduate degree programme at University of the West Indies, University of Technology, Northern Caribbean University, Montego Bay Community College, Sam Sharpe Teachers College and Churches Teachers College. The six males and four female awardees are pursuing studies in the field of Medicine, Pharmacy, Psychology, Environmental Health, Social Work, Business Studies, International Relations, Counselling and Education.

The awards were non-denominational and recipients were selected based on good academic performance and verifiable financial need. This assistance is quite timely for these students as their families have been experiencing financial hardships which is further compounded by the effects of the pandemic. The church is happy to be able to ease the tuition cost burden for these families and to assist in keeping our youths on the path to learning.

Baywest Hospital is owned and operated by Dr. Germaine and Kerene Spencer from the Lucea congregation. The awards ceremony was held on April 18.

The Lucea United Church which celebrated its 190th anniversary last year, has anchored its position in the parish of Hanover as a needs meeting church catering to the spirit, social and economic wellbeing of not just individuals but the entire family.


The United Church in Jamaica and the Cayman Islands The United Church Young People's Fellowship President's Message for Synodical Youth Sunday


