From Farm to Table at Mount Olivet Boys' Home -Sheree Oconnor Programme Secretary, SRMC

Since 2018, the Mount Olivet Boys' Home in Manchester has been on a mission to provide quality tea leaves. The project began with conversation with the leadership of Jamaica Information Service, Mr Norman Wright, CEO of Perishables Jamaica Limited and Mr. Patrick Newman, Director of the Mount Olivet Boys Home (MOBH).

A demand for tea was noted and created an income generating opportunity for the home. One hundred (100) tea plants were donated to start the project. These included Peppermint, Neem and Rosemary. Additional Peppermint plants have since been added to the project.

The home received assistance and training in caring for the plants and the proper way to reap in order to provide leaves of optimal quality.

After harvesting the leaves, they are dried and sold to Perishables Jamaica Limited, manufacturers of Tops and Sipacupa tea brands. The harvest a few months ago generated \$59,000 in revenue, with another harvest to take place in the next couple of months.

Residents of the home have also gotten involved with the project under the guidance of Mr. Rohan Loney, the

farmer at the home. This creates an opportunity for the boys to learn about tea plants and to earn pocket money.

### Other activities

As MOBH seeks to improve its food security, other farming projects are on-going. Crops like plantain, banana, cabbage, carrot and pak choi are also grown. Cassava is also grown with prospects of a market. Animal rearing of pigs, goats and cows are part of the farming activities as well.

Most of the farm's yield goes towards providing meals for the boys and the excess is sold.

### **Challenges**

All is not copacetic as the cost of labour on the farm does pose a challenge for the home. Furthermore, the greenhouse, a major source of revenue, was damaged in Tropical Storm Grace in 2021. However, help on the farm is received occasionally and members of the Diaspora in Georgia are assisting with greenhouse repairs.

With 12.8% of Jamaicans experiencing food insecurity in Jamaica, according to a report released in January 2021, it is imperative that we use our resources to increase availability and access to food. Mount Olivet Boys' Home is an excellent example of using available resources to generate income as well as to provide food.



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This is the process of recycling organic material into a valuable fertilizer that can enrich soil and plants. It improves the soil's physical characteristics; increases the soil capacity to hold water and nutrients and increases soil aeration.

### Materials for Composting Include:

- Kitchen scraps such as fruit and vegetable trimmings, coffee grounds and filters, and eggshells. Do not use animal products.
- Some other materials that can be used for composting are dry leaves, grass clippings, manure, sawdust and shredded newspaper.





### The Backyard Church Garden of Little London United Church in Westmoreland

This project is spearheaded by Elder Maxine Gooden. The produce from this garden supports the Soup Kitchen run by the Congregation.

Approximately 40 persons in need, benefit weekly from this Ministry.
