Seek God's Approval Not People's Rev. Garwell Bacchas, NERMC

Proverbs 29:25. Fearing people is a dangerous trap, but trusting the LORD means safety.

If your life's goal is to have the approval of people, or your flock, especially us Pastors you will never really feel secure. Why is that? Because the time will come when you do something they disapprove of; then what? The Bible says, "Fearing people is a dangerous trap, but trusting the LORD means safety." (v. 25 NLT). A trap is just another word for a prison. If someone, other than God, can determine your worth as a person, that someone can make you feel like a prisoner anytime he/she decides to. When a critic's opinion becomes your own opinion, you are living in a prison of your own making. Let's face it: some of the people/sheep you are trying so hard to impress will never be impressed. And you must accept this: From God's perspective, it does not matter. Knowing that enables you to work alongside people/sheep without allowing yourself to be controlled by their moods and governed by their opinions. Each time Paul went to another town, people were meeting and hearing him for the first time. Some of them liked him, and some did not.

He writes, "For some say, 'Paul's letters are demanding and forceful, but in person he is weak, and his speeches are worthless!" (2 Co 10:10 NLT). So how did Paul handle this? He writes, "Obviously, I'm not trying to win the approval of people, but of God. If pleasing people were my goal, I would not be Christ's servant" (Gal 1:10 NLT).

Even as we discuss the future of the region and the church, in my limited understanding, I am sure that some of the sheep might not like it, and I dare say maybe some shepherds do not approve of it, but remember it is not to please people or to get people's approval but to please God and get His approval and in the end we are doing it for the good of the Church.

In order to feel secure in life and fulfilled in what you're doing, you must reach the place where you can look in the mirror and say, "I'm loved and approved by God, and that's what matters!"

Pringle Home for Children

For 100 years, the Pringle Home for Children has been blessed with the support of communities, near and far, joining hands to meet needs and fulfill its mission. To show its appreciation, the PHC family held its first Open Day on August 24, 2022, where healthcare and social services were made accessible to the people in Carron Hall, St. Mary.

From 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. the people of the community paraded the grounds of the home getting massages, cosmetology services and face paintings, and tasting scrumptious items from The HEART Trust/ NSTA and the local jerk man.

The old and young took advantage of the health team by getting back to school medicals and check ups done. Information on Non-Communicable Disease, NCDs, healthy living and exercise, Coronavirus and Monkeypox were available.

Present at the other tents were representatives from the First Regional Cooperative Credit Union, Jamaica National Bank, the Ministry of Labor and Social Security, Moneague College, The Jamaica Fire Brigade, Jamaica Constabulary Force and the Child Protection and Family Services Agency (CPFSA).

Library Handover

While the services were being kick started, the stakeholders gathered for the handover of the newly refurbished resource room. The room now hosts 11 computers, a printer, a projector and additional books donated by various persons.

Mrs. Jeanette Rose-Bryan, Director of Pringle Home shared that five computers were donated by CHASE Fund through the assistance of Mary White and the rest were donated by the CPFSA.

"HEART TRUST/NSTA came down to help us with installing the computers and the Jamaica Library Service assisted us with the organization of the books," she added.

Among those present for the library reopening were Mrs. Rosalee Gage-Grey, Chief Executive Officer of the Child Protection and Family Services Agency, Mrs. Hermena Davidson, Chair of the Board of Pringle Home, Mrs. Jennifer Martin, Chair of the North East Regional Council. The proceedings were led by Dr. Pansy Hamilton, Chair of Pringle Home's 100th Anniversary Celebration and the library was dedicated by Pastor Emerella Forde.

Wycliffe Bible Translators - Cayman

A Caymanian missionary couple (Jim and Karla Smith) live in Timor Leste (East Timor) working in bible translation, literacy, and Christian education.

They live with their daughter, Katherine, and twin grandchildren, Jamie, and Joanna. The two official languages in East Timor are Tetun and Portuguese with less than 1% of the population speaking Portuguese.

Tetun is taught in schools, but most families speak their own language in their respective communities. Jim provides leadership in the local church supporting the pastor, works with the ongoing training of pre-school teachers, and oversees the grandchildren's online schooling. Karla works with the Ministry of Education to develop various literacy programs.

"We are thankful the Lord has kept us going, even as our years add up. We are already at or close to what is considered "retirement" age by many, but the Lord has not yet released us from the work He has given



us, and we are honored to continue to be part of building His Kingdom through our work," the Smiths said.



THE FACTS ON **GET**

What is Monkeypox Disease?

A rare disease that is caused by an infection from the monkeypox virus

How is the Monkeypox virus transmitted?

- It can be transmitted from animals to humans through:
- bites or scratches by an animal carrying the virus handling and eating meat from infected animals
- It can be transmitted from human to human through close contact with:
- skin lesions e.g. rash, blister, sores, scab, etc
- body fluids
- droplets from respiratory secretions e.g. cough, sneeze, spit recently contaminated objects e.g. bed linen, clothes and frequently touched areas

What is the incubation period?

The incubation period (time between infection and when the symptoms start) is usually from 6 to 13 days but can range as 5 to 21 days

What are the main signs and symptoms?

- ♦ Fever ♦ Chills ♦ Intense Headaches ♦ Extreme Exhaustion
- Muscle ache and Backache
 Swollen lymph nodes
 Rash (usually appears 1-3 days after the fever)

Symptoms can be mild or severe and associated skin rash can be itchy or painful

What is the treatment for Monkeypox Disease?

Treatment is based on the symptoms. If experiencing fever or pain, Panadol can be taken Drink lots of fluids to maintain hydration

Who is at risk of being infected with the Monkeypox virus?

Any person in close contact with someone who has monkeypox

How can the risk of getting Monkeypox be reduced? Key prevention measures include COVID-19 prevention measures:

Wear your mask
 Wash your hands
 Physical Distance
 Frequently sanitise areas that are frequently touched
 Avoid crowds





Is there a Vaccine for Monkeypox?

• There is a vaccine against monkeypox that is generally available. A recently approved vaccine has been produced for research purpose only

Jamaica has no known case of monkeypox at this time.
